

Museum of the Wagoners Special Reserve Facilities and Access Statement

As well as improving physical access to the museum we aim to provide thoughtful inclusive information and interpretation to enhance the experience for everyone visiting the museum.

Facilities

- **Café.** There is an adjacent cafe in the court yard, with level access, and no ramps.
- **Temperature.** Please note: the temperature in the museum can be cool in Winter.
- **Toilets.** There are accessible toilets for wheelchair users within 25yards of the museum in the café courtyard.

Accessibility

Cost the museum is free of charge.

Please get in touch. Disabled visitors are encouraged to contact the curator in advance to ensure they get the best advice and help for their particular needs.

Parking. Specific disabled parking is available in the car park), which is approximately 50 meters from the entrance. Parking is free of charge

Access. There is level access to the museum. However it crosses some compacted gravel and the new pathway into the museum is being changed from cobbles to stone setts.

The museum is very small approx. 8 feet by 17 feet. There is room to turn a wheelchair in the museum area.

Blind and partially sighted people are advised to watch/listen to the 12 minute video available with seating in the museum. It has a

comprehensive commentary that explains the whole story of the Wagoners Special Reserve.

Length of visit. The museum is very small and most people spend between 5 and 15 minutes in the museum.

Object handling.

The only object that can be handled/touched is a large bronze bust of Sir Mark Sykes. However the museum has handling boxes. Please contact the curator to make arrangements to use them.

Guide dogs and assistance dogs are welcome there is water for the dogs in the courtyard.

Researchers. Please contact the curator if you are wanting to research any element of the collection. Approximately 80% of the collection is on display.
